DISABILITIES AND THE LAW

According to the 11 February 2005 law, " A person with a disability is defined as someone who is subjected to any limitation of activities or restriction to participating society, owing to a substantial lasting or permanent impairment of one or more physical, sensory, mental, cognitive or psychic functions, multiple disabilities or a disabling health condition."

The Ministry of Higher Education and Research (Le Ministère de l'Enseignement Supérieur et de la Recherche, MESR) emphasises the application of the 2005-102 law, known as the Disabilities Law, notably the non-discrimination of students with disabilities in higher education, and on the implementation of reasonable academic accommodations.



DO I HAVE A DISABILITY?

I lose attention/find it difficult to concentrate in class or in daily life.

I am temporarily affected by an accident

I have a disease (disabling, rare, degenerative, auto-immune, etc.) that keeps me from living fully or has consequences on my daily life.

I have trouble hearing, and this affects my daily life and learning.

I have tinnitus (ringing in the ears).

I have trouble seeing, and this affects my daily life and learning

I have an eating disorder.

I am experiencing depression.

I am partially or completely deprived of one of my five senses

If you have ticked one or several boxes, you may have a disability. Please note that this list is not exhaustive. If there is a situation affecting your academic life, please speak to your general practitioner or the Disabilities Inclusion Officer at BSB (Mission Handicap).

DIFFERENT TYPES

OF DIABILITIES

COGNITIVE DISABILITIES

Cognitive disabilities develop over the course of childhood, before or during early learning, and continue to adulthood. They have academic, professional, and social repercussions. Most of them are innate and are grouped into 6 categories:

- Dyslexia/dysorthographia: specific difficulties acquiring written language;
- Dysphasia: specific difficulties developing spoken language;
- Dyspraxia: specific difficulties developing motor and/or visual-spatial functions;
- Attention deficit disorder with or without hyperactivity (ADHD): specific difficulties developing attention and/or executive functions;
- Specific memory function disorders;
- Dyscalculia: specific difficulties with numerical activities.

SENSORY DISABILITIES

Sensory disabilities are the result of one or several senses. Most concern auditive or visual impairments. This type of disability results in quasi-automatic communication and social difficulties for the person.

- Hearing impairment: hearing loss can be mild, moderate, severe or profound affecting one or both ears. It can have social consequences and lead to learning issues;
- Visual impairment: covers a wide range of impairments, from benign visual issues (nearsightedness for example) to total blindness.

DISABLING CONDITIONS

There are numerous disabling conditions, which can be temporary, permanent, or progressive. Their effects on the body can lead to a disability and progress. Disabling conditions include respiratory diseases (cystic fibrosis), digestive track diseases (Crohn's, etc.), neurodegenerative diseases (multiple sclerosis, etc.), cancer, rare hereditary diseases, musculoskeletal disorders, Alzheimer's, AIDS, etc. According to how they evolve, as well as the availability of treatment, these diseases can have many consequences.

MENTAL DISABILITIES

Mental disabilities result from mental disease. Intellectual capacities remain intact.

Mental disabilities are related to neurosis (obsessional-compulsive behaviour, depression etc.), or psychosis (schizophrenia, bipolar disorders, etc.), which affect thoughts, feelings, and emotions. Symptoms are not regular and unpredictable. Medication as well as treatment are often necessary.

AUTISIC SPECTRUM DISORDERS

Autistic spectrum disorders stem from neurodevelopmental anomalies. They manifest through difficulties establishing social interaction and communicating. There are also behavioural issues (reticence or change, reluctance to change, repetitive behaviour or repetitive speech, isolation). People with autistic spectrum disorders have particular sensory reactions (auditive, visual, cutaneous).

MOTOR DIABILITIES

Motor disabilities can affect a limb, a motor function or the entire body. People with these disabilities move around standing up with a cane or in a wheelchair.

MENTAL HANDICAP

Intellectual impairment is characterised by difficulties understanding incoming information and by slowed mental functions.

BSB's Mission Handicap was created in 2009 and has been part of the School's One Health Center (Personal Development Department) since 2023.

Here, questions about academics, exams, studying/working abroad, internships/work-study, joining the job market, administrative formalities, and campus life can be freely discussed to set up personalised student support.

Mission Handicap at BSB is in regular contact with the other departments to meet students' specific needs and provide global student support. They include Student Administration and Student Life, Corporate Relations, International Relations and academic departments.

REPORTINGA DISABILITY

- Make an appointment with Mission Handicap at BSB (missionhandicap@bsb-education.com);
- You will receive a contact form and an appointment date to define your needs. Confidentiality is of the utmost importance.
- To meet your specific needs, you will be asked to provide a certificate attesting to your disability (medical certificate, PAP (Personalised assistance plan)/PAI (Personalised care project)/PPS (Personalized academic project), accommodation notices for the latest admissions exam, etc.);
- Upon your approval, your accommodation will become official, and your accommodations certificate will be sent to the departments (Student Administration, academic, etc.) concerned with the relative information;
- According to your needs, follow up meetings can be set up throughout your academic journey at BSB.

Your accommodation will be automatically renewed at the start of each new academic year and can be modified if your situation changes.

AVAILABLE

ACCOMMODATIONS

BSB has set up several accommodations to meet the different needs of students with disabilities:

- Additional time for written assessments and final exams;
- Additional time for oral assessments and final exams;
- Individual quite rooms.
- Authorised use of laptops in class, for continuous assessments and exams;
- Spelling mistakes not taken into account;
- Break time with/without deferral at end of continuous assessment/exams;
- Exam secretaries;
- Access to food and drink during class and/or exams;
- Attendance waivers;
- Foreign language tutoring;
- Accommodations for the TOEIC
- Other accommodations possible according to individual student needs.

BSB campuses are reduced mobility friendly.

The School always does its utmost to adapt to the specific needs of students with disabilities, which is why we encourage you to contact BSB's Mission Handicap to prepare studying with us if you are still in the application process, or throughout your studies if you are already a BSB student.

This can mean being recognised as a **disabled worker**, receiving financial aid or **support when looking for work**, or completing the Cerfa N°15692*01 form, which consolidates all necessary information.
