

Allocation of ECTS credits at Burgundy School of Business

The allocation of ECTS credits at Burgundy School of Business is based on:

- The group average mark for a specific module (average of the mark obtained by each student in a specific module). The average mark of the student is then compared to the group average mark.

- The standard deviation - measure of the deviation of a set of values. The standard deviation is an indication about the homogeneity of the results.

- The ECTS grading scale is based on the class percentile (similar, but not identical to the class rank) of a student in a given assessment, that is how he/she performed relative to other students in the same class (or in a significant group of students). The ECTS system classifies students into broad groups and thus makes interpretation of ranking simpler. This grouping is the core of the ECTS grading system.

- The ECTS system initially divides students between pass and fail groups, and then assesses the performance of these two groups separately. Those obtaining passing grades are divided into five subgroups: the best 10% are awarded an A-grade, the next 25% a B-grade, the following 30% a C-grade, the following 25% a D-grade and the final 10% an E-grade.

This system has been devised in order to ensure equity among students as ECTS grades are not only granted on the basis of students' results, but put into perspective with the group's results. As a result, Burgundy School of Business does not provide a fix conversion table between marks and ECTS grading.

Validation of the semester of study at Burgundy School of Business

According to Burgundy School of Business' academic regulations, 10 out of 20 is the passing grade. In case the mark of one module is lower than 10 out of 20, students will have to sit a retake exam in order to validate the module.

Retake exam

<u>Bachelor level</u>: According to Burgundy School of Business' academic regulations, retake exams are organized at the end of the academic year (April / May).

<u>Master level</u>: According to Burgundy School of Business' academic regulations, retake exams are organized the academic year following the exchange period.
